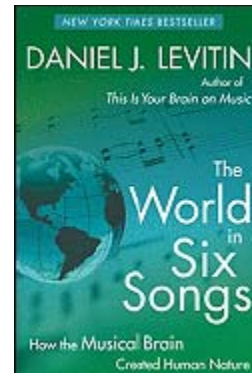
## The World in Six Songs by Daniel Levitin
